

We are Vancouver, Washington. City on the river.

The Columbia River makes this a great place to work, live and play, connecting 20 miles of waterfront on our southern and western shores. Inland, streams form our Columbia River watershed, from Burnt Bridge Creek to Vancouver Lake. Our River nurtures wildlife, evergreen forests, our families, neighborhoods and businesses within a single, vibrant river community.

The City of Vancouver provides core services for a safe, thriving community.

From public safety to economic development, to parks and community centers, our City delivers core services. The State of the City address, at our Water Resources Education Center, reminds us not only of the City's efficient delivery of water and wastewater services, but also the importance of our watershed to drinking water and our quality of life. Interaction at the Water Center helps us rediscover our connection to the river.

Waterfront redevelopment: reconnecting downtown to the Columbia River.

Work is now underway to reopen access previously blocked for 104 years. Next year, Vancouver Waterfront Park breaks ground, and we'll extend our Columbia River Renaissance trail, now used by one million people per year.

Vancouver is a city of firsts: First city on the Columbia River. First city in what is now Washington State.

2012 Progress Report

City Council adopted a balanced 2013-14 budget

- Preserved a balance of core City services without cuts
- Investments in efficient, effective and sustainable core services

2012 community survey showed residents think we are on the right path

- Increased satisfaction with City decisions
- Wanted no major cuts, no new taxes
- Despite service cuts and recession,
 Quality of Life and Livability increased



Despite the Great Recession, our City is in better financial condition today than 2009-2012

- Mayor and City Council and City Manager made swift, difficult decisions to live within limited means
- Underlying deficit remains and is being addressed
- Council adopted progressive new financial policies to help navigate the future

Vancouver Police continues as top community service priority

- Violent crime down 8%, total crime down 3%
- To improve neighborhood safety, VPD has deployed:
- ~100+ active citizen volunteers in Neighbors On Watch (NOW) program
- ~Four Neighborhood Police Officers
- ~Two Neighborhood Response teams
- Service assessment currently underway
- Recruitment of new Chief this year

Vancouver Fire Department charts ways to sustain services

- Responded to 23,000 emergency calls, 62.5 calls per day
- Maintained response times despite economic challenges
- Lengthy community-based assessment explored new alternatives
- Strategic redesign of EMS and ambulance transports underway
- Grant funding for emergency response boat and critical equipment
- Planning new SUV response to reduce fire engine use
- Developing a new sustainable department redesign for Council consideration

Achieved significant savings through smart, conservative financial planning

- Continuing trend of clean audits
- Increased credit rating, 2012 debt refinancing will save public \$2.8 million
- First full year in City Hall higher than expected savings of \$1.1 million by downsizing from five buildings. Savings are ongoing.

Provided high quality water, sewer and stormwater services

- Vancouver's rates among the lowest in the region
- Delivered 9.2 billion gallons of clean drinking water
- Treated 8 billion gallons of wastewater
- Recycled 800 million gallons of irrigation water for reuse

Parks and Recreation remains key to Vancouver's quality of life

- 369,000 visits to recreation centers by pass holders and 75,000 drop-in guests
- 3 million people used bike and walking paths
- 15 acres of new public space added in partnership with other agencies
- Experts studied new opportunities, such as revisiting the city/county partnership



Did you know? In the last ten years, your City property taxes have increased less than a dollar a month. Today, you're paying \$45 a month – ten years ago you paid \$44.30. During that time, prices have risen due to inflation by 22%.

Making Vancouver a better place – now and for the future

Vancouver supports new businesses, job creation, community health and vibrancy. Through hard work and partnerships, we bring new vitality to Vancouver and enhance quality of life.

- Pictured above: Downtown, our Waterfront Access project will reconnect people to the Columbia River this year and is attracting \$1.3 billion in private investment for a mixed-use development, including a new Waterfront Community Park and extension of our popular riverfront trail.
- On Vancouver's modern east side, the 192nd Avenue and Highway 14 corridor is one of the premier employment and housing clusters in the region. The City will continue to support this area by building partnerships and funding for needed public infrastructure.

Working together for a brighter future: more than 1,000 students, from kindergarten through high school, collect water quality and habitat data during the school year working with the City of Vancouver's Water Resources Education Center.

- In east Vancouver, Columbia Tech Center continues to evolve as an economic hub. The new 52,000-square-foot Nautilus building and remodeled Kuni headquarters offer workforce housing and amenities to attract new tenants.
- 2012 major commercial projects: Great Western Malting (\$4.1 million); Cinetopia (\$10.5 million); The Quarry Senior Living (\$6.5 million).
- We partner to promote a digitally savvy workforce, a strategy of the Regional Economic Development Plan.
